From The Pastor's Desk

Monday, January 26, was an amazing day! We had more than a foot of fresh, powdery snow. I'm not a skier, I'm sure they were ecstatic, but I do like to snowshoe! Since we moved to Maine, I hadn't had my snowshoes out, but this snowfall was so inviting that I could not resist.

I have great snowshoes. Mine are the Tubbs brand from when they were still making them in Vermont. I bought several sizes, and for this fresh snow, I chose the 36-inch pair. These long ones have the greatest buoyancy for walking in fresh snow. I was glad I chose them because even they sank into the snow. As I set out, I clearly remembered something important. It is hard to be the first person to traverse the freshly fallen snow!

It is always hard to be the first one to chart a new path, take a new direction, or follow a different way. I imagine that is what Jesus felt when he began his ministry. The Gospels tell us that he began after John was arrested. John had charted a path, and Jesus would pick up where he left off, but Jesus would have to take a much different direction. While he might have followed in John's footsteps at first, he soon had to leave that road and forge a new trail.

Imagine, then, what it was like to be one of the first disciples. Jesus boldly asked many of them to do something they had never done before. Andrew, James, Peter, and John were all in the commercial fishing business. Jesus came along and asked them to take a radically different direction—to follow a path no one else had yet charted. Jesus would lead them, but they had no idea where.

As I set out through the woods, I could not see the trail. At least I had walked it before and had the benefit of previous experience and of being able to see the clearing between the trees. Since the leaves are gone, I could usually see the condominium buildings through the woods, so I knew I wouldn't go too far astray. Still, I had moments of uncertainty, wondering if I was going the right way. It was also tough going because it is hard work to snowshoe on

unbroken, fluffy snow. I had to stop and rest more often than I'd like to acknowledge.

About halfway through my walk, I met a couple coming from the opposite direction, also wearing snowshoes. We stopped to talk, and all realized that we would now be walking on a path that someone else had forged before us. The difference was noticeable. I no longer had to think about where I was going because the path was clear. It was also much less exertion because I was taking advantage of someone else's hard work.

It occurs to me that this is a metaphor both for our spiritual journey and the church. In the church, while we each discover our own, unique path, we can often follow a path that others have walked before us. We need not always plow through the fresh snow, and much of the time we have companions who can help us along the way. While there can be great freedom and joy in being the first ones to cross the unbroken snow, there is also great comfort in finding a path that others have walked, that others have prepared for you.

The disciples would never have walked the path without Jesus. He led. He packed down the snow for them. He showed the way. Then, one day, they found they had to do it on their own—and they could because of all that he showed them and did for them. That is why we have the church—why we need it and why it is a gift for us. There are always others who can help when we are weary or wandering. We do not walk alone.

Still, I encourage you to put on your snowshoes—both the literal ones and the metaphorical ones. Go for a walk, feel the freedom of forging a path, maybe you will even make a way for others to follow. And don't hesitate to follow gladly where others have led, for those paths are just as beautiful and, perhaps, even better because you know others have been there—and they may even join you on the journey! Valentine's Day

We probably think of romance when Valentine's Day comes. That's fine, but there's more to the story than that.

St. Valentine was a Christian priest and martyr who lived about A.D. 270. The Roman emperor at the time was Claudius II. Claudius had been a successful general. He would not allow his soldiers to marry, because he wanted to make sure, they could go to battle quickly. He thought family ties would make the men reluctant to leave home. Because Valentine promoted marriage and family life, he was jailed and later convicted of going against the orders of the emperor. He was martyred on February 14, the day we remember him and our loved ones.



While he was in jail, the jailer's daughter befriended him. He wrote her a letter of appreciation and signed it "Your Valentine." The tradition of exchanging valentines grew out of that heartfelt gesture.

January Sunday School

Their examples included being kind, hugging people, helping Mom, and cleaning up. They are on the right track. The last Sunday of the month focused on working together and being together as a church family. The children made clay figures representing each of them, and together they created the flame and the cross.

A heartfelt thank you to every adult, teacher, or teacher's helper who is choosing to be upstairs with the children. These people are giving up the chance to hear Pastor Greg's inspiring sermon and to enjoy the beautiful music, among other things.
