From the Pastor's Desk

Our society has been shaken by the public and horrific shooting of Charlie Kirk. In the age of social media, information and speculation spread rapidly and indiscriminately. I have refrained from commenting on this situation precisely because I recognize my lack of knowledge and information.

With that in mind, there are some things I can and will say with clarity. I have always condemned violence against anyone. There is no place in a civil society for violent acts to further your cause, your political position, or your point of view. No matter how vehemently you may disagree with someone's position or their action, killing them is not an acceptable way to make your point. This was a terrible and inexcusable act.

It is also important to acknowledge that we do not know why the young man who murdered Charlie Kirk did what he did. There are countless theories speculative explanations floating around the various media platforms—and all of them are speculation. Unless and until the young man tells us why he did what he did, we do not know. All of us need to pause and acknowledge that. You may want to know we all do when something like this happens—but you don't, at least not for now. In fact, the young man who did this may not even know himself exactly what pushed him to do such a terrible thing. That is often the case with violent actions—the perpetrators may not fully understand their own motivations and actions.

Blaming is almost always wrong and rarely helpful. It is especially harmful when we lack information, and we begin blaming based on speculation and our own biases. We are prone to succumbing to conspiracy theories and thinking the worst of those we view as the "opposition."

Charlie Kirk's murder should provoke us to do very deep soul-searching as a nation. Why is it that there seems to be such intense disagreement and conflict among us? Are we really as divided as some would have us believe, or are we being manipulated and managed into conflict for the benefit of a few individuals who want to control us? How can we have meaningful conversation and interaction even when we disagree—even if we disagree strenuously?

To paraphrase the prophet Jeremiah, it seems as if there is no balm in Gilead to heal our society. We don't need to agree about everything to be healthy and well. We do need to find a way to speak respectfully and listen authentically. We do need to reject violence as a way to get what we want. We need to respect every human life and affirm the equality and value of every person.

Every time someone is killed, it is a loss for all of us. It doesn't matter if we agreed with that person or liked that person. It doesn't matter if the person was well-known or hardly noticed. We should grieve everyone. Today, we pray for Charlie Kirk's family, who have suffered a terrible tragedy and loss. May we also pray that we never have to pray such a prayer again.

All Saints Celebration, November 1

On the first Sunday of November, we will share our celebration of All Saints. In some churches, they distinguish between All Saints, which is a celebration of recognized Saints, and All Souls, which is a celebration of all the faithful who have died. The word "saint" translates the Greek word "hagio," which essentially means "holy ones." It often referred to all those who are faithful in Christ. In light of this and since United Methodists do not have a process of recognizing and designating saints, I have always regarded our celebration as one of All the Saints—meaning all who have lived lives of faith.

Following our tradition, we will name loved ones who have died since November 1 of last year. Please contact the Church office with those names if you would like them included in our time of remembrance. During the liturgy, we will give you the opportunity to honor other loved ones who have died in past years.

Our yearly Church Conference will be held on November 16 at 2:00 p.m. We will be joined by members from the churches in Sanford and Arundel. We will learn about ways for churches to consider working together and talk about how we might explore cooperative work in our area. 



Faye stated:




We present this sign in dedication to the almighty God and the service of CHURCH ON THE CAPE in the loving memory of Dr. David A Kerr.
